A TINY 'LIGHT' IN THE CORONAVIRUS TUNNEL?

According to the British evangelical commentator, Adrian Warnock, one in four persons in Britain (as of mid-June) had attended an on-line worship service since the churches had been on lock-down for several weeks. Among young adults, that figure was one in three. He called these figures "astonishing" in a country with one of the lowest attendance patterns in Europe.

Citing a report in *The Guardian*, which is not regarded as a "pro-church" newspaper, he added that "70 percent of church leaders report a rise in church attendance."

Warnock urged that regularly-attending church members encourage their unchurched relatives and friends, by sending them a link to their church's services over social media or text messages.

"Some churches report double the number of virtual attendees then they did back 'in real life.' Except isn't on-line the real world now?" he wrote.

Why this new interest? Warnock offered a few possibilities.

One is that people in need are becoming more aware of community services, such as food banks and counseling, offered by churches. Further, "people who were once complacent about

spiritual matters before are now shaken; economic problems are family problems."

In addition, "many who would never darken the door of a church will attend virtually because there is no embarrassment, and no chance of a Christian handshake or, worse yet for shy people, a hug."

As a result, he wrote, "Many people are experiencing Christian worship, preaching, and some form of fellowship for the first time ever," some of whom may never once stepped inside a church building.

Similarly, a study by Britain's Evangelical Alliance, across a wide range of Christian denominations and covering 700 congregations and 196 faith-based agencies, revealed that "a marked increase in people are exploring our Christian faith," adding that "thousands are engaging with church for the first time as a place of hope."

All of which suggest that this season of adjustments and modifications in our church life may be God's way of presenting us with some new opportunities and new means to reach people whom the church, for whatever reason, may not have been reaching with God's message of hope and healing. If so, how can we make the most of this unique opportunity?

In other words, is this possibly the light we were looking for at the end of an increasingly long, circuitous, and dark Cornonavirus tunnel?

From the Parish Nurse IRRITABLE BOWEL SYNDROME

Unlike many other health conditions, irritable bowel syndrome is hard to talk about.

Irritable bowel syndrome (IBS) is a common disorder that affects the large intestine. Signs and symptoms include cramping, abdominal pain, bloating, gas, diarrhea or constipation, or both. IBS is a chronic condition which, if you contract it, you will need to mange long term.

Most people with IBS experience times when the signs and symptoms are worse and times when they improve or even disappear completely. Only a small number of people with IBS have severe signs and symptoms yet the precise cause of IBS is unknown. Some people can control their symptoms by managing their diet, their lifestyle, and/or their stress. More severe symptoms can be treated with medication and counseling. The good news is that IBS doesn't cause changes in bowel tissue or increase your risk of colorectal cancer.

Some signs and symptoms for which to look are weight loss, diarrhea (especially at

night), unexplained vomiting, rectal bleeding, difficult swallowing, and iron deficiency anemia.

You should see a doctor, if you have a persistent changes in bowel habits or other signs or symptoms of IBS. They may also indicate a more serious condition, such as colon cancer.
